Missing Out 2025: £24.1 billion in unclaimed support


Why this matters

- Over 7.5 million households miss out on help they are eligible for
- This is not about individual failings, but system design
- Missed support means: higher debt, colder homes, poorer health




The scale of the problem

- Households miss out both on essentials and on major income top ups
- The impact of claiming support is substantive:
 - Pensioners could unlock nearly £9,000 in a year
 - Working families could claim around £995 per month in UC





What has changed since last year?





Research questions

How much support is going unclaimed across key benefits (e.g., UC, Pension Credit, Council Tax Support, Carer's Allowance, Healthy Start, social tariffs)?

How do changes in policy (e.g., UC migration, expansions of schemes like Warm Home Discount) affect eligibility and missed support?

What are the drivers of low take-up, and where are opportunities for targeted action?

Public datasets, reports, etc.

Policy expertise, literature review, our practice

How we know this

Methods

- Combined public administrative data (DWP, HMRC, NHS, Ofgem, Ofcom, CCW), survey data (FRS, Census, school census), and FOI responses.
- Estimate eligibility at household, individual, or child level; apply official or proxy take-up rates to identify likely non-claimants.
- Calculate unclaimed support by multiplying missing claims by average awards, updated for 2025/26 rules and values, using specific assumptions for each benefit.



Centrally administered benefits

Main trends

- Universal Credit: £11.1bn rising caseload, managed migration not completed
- Pension Credit: £1.6bn take-up improving but still
 760,000 pensioners missing out
- Carer's Allowance: £2.4bn complex rules and risk of overpayments deter claims
- Child Benefit: £1.5bn High Income Child Benefit Charge still a barrier

Why this matters

- UC is the **gateway** to other help (FSM, CTS, social tariffs)
- PC unlocks wider support (housing, CTS, energy discounts)
- CA supports unpaid carers underpinning the care system
- CB is simple but under-claimed due to policy design

Locally administered benefits

Main trends

- Council Tax Support: £3.3bn schemes shrinking, more arrears, postcode lottery
- Housing Benefit (PA): £1.1bn linked to Pension Credit take-up
- Free School Meals: £69m take-up rate is high, but auto-enrolment could close the gap
- Healthy Start/Best Start Foods: £55m modest but vital for children's nutrition

Why this matters

- Local schemes keep Council Tax affordable and prevent arrears
- HB and CTS are critical for older households on low incomes
- FSM and Healthy Start boost child development and health
- Design of local schemes directly affects poverty and debt

Social tariffs and energy support

Main trends

- Broadband: £1.5bn 7.5m households missing out, awareness is very low
- Water tariffs: £0.7bn 3.8m households eligible; DEFRA moving towards single tariff
- Warm Homes Discount: £0.7bn eligibility widened, missed support tripled since last year
- TV Licences: £52m linked to Pension Credit claims

Why this matters

- Everyday essentials: water, energy, broadband = basic costs of living
- Missed support is rising fast for schemes like WHD, showing how policy shifts affect take-up
- Utilities and regulators are critical partners in tackling missed support

Why people miss out (system barriers)

Awareness

Many don't know they qualify, especially if working or with savings

Complexity

Long forms, multiple systems, digital exclusion

Stigma

Fear of judgment, shame, distrust of the system



Solutions (areas for action)

Boost awareness

Targeted, personalised campaigns work (e.g. Pension Credit letters)

Reduce complexity

Single application models like *Apply Once*

Challenge stigma

Clear, respectful communication makes claiming easier




